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Beltway History and Politics Course Information and Materials:

Course Overview:

This course will be taught in Washington, D.C. by faculty affiliated with the University of Missouri Kinder Institute on Constitutional Democracy. The course will meet for seminars on Thursday evenings, from 7:00-9:00 p.m., at the Lobby Level Seminar Room in WISH-Woodley Park, and on Friday during the day, at historic sites around the Washington, D.C. area.

This course is an experiential overview of American political history for students in the Kinder Scholars program. Students will experience how American constitutional democracy was developed and implemented right here on the Potomac, and as much as possible in the actual places where the events occurred. Emphasis will be placed on interplay between constitutional theory and actual political experience throughout history and the tensions and institutional changes that emerged as Americans and their government coped with cataclysmic social changes, unparalleled economic development, and fearsome international challenges.

Course Expectations & Evaluation Criteria:

Weekly Seminar Meeting:

First and foremost, the Kinder Scholars program is academically driven, and all participants must enroll in and complete all coursework for HIS/POL SC 4900: Beltway History. Taught by Kinder Institute faculty in a seminar setting, the course is designed to engage students in an in-depth

examination of the philosophical foundations and historical development of American constitutional democracy from the colonial age through the present day. To that end, Kinder Scholars are expected to thoughtfully complete the assigned readings prior to each week's seminar and to actively participate in each week's discussion.

Weekly Reflective Summary Papers:

Prior to each week's seminar, you are expected to prepare a short, one to two page paper (using Times New roman, 12 point font, double spacing) summarizing and reflecting upon the major themes of the week's reading assignment. At the end of your paper, please include a numbered list of 3 questions about the readings that you would like to see addressed or discussed in that week's seminar. You will submit your Weekly Reflective Summary on Canvas no later than 11:00 p.m. on Tuesday prior to Thursday's seminar. For example, the assignment for Thursday, June 15th, is due on Canvas no later than 11:00 p.m. on Tuesday, June 12th. Your Weekly Reflective Summary will be provided to the seminar professor prior to that week's seminar.

Weekly Field Trips:

Weekly field trips are designed to enhance students' studies by allowing them to learn about constitutional history and political development in places where it actually unfolded. Field trips take place on Fridays and participation is mandatory. Be certain to check the syllabus for field trip departure times and locations. We strongly recommend that you arrive at the departure location 10-15 minutes prior to the departure time. Field trips will depart on time and failure to participate due to late arrival will be counted as an absence.

An Important Note About Attendance:

Attendance and active engagement in the course seminars and field trips are **mandatory**. Please note that an absence from class does not excuse you from completing the Weekly Reflective Summary for that class session.

Field Trip: Library of Congress

Dr. Overby will be a Kluge Fellow at the Library of Congress for the Fall 2018 semester and has arranged for a special tour for the Kinder Scholars. On Friday morning, you will take the Metro from Woodley Park to the Capitol South Metro stop, which is on the Blue/Orange/Silver Line. The Library of Congress is a 2 block walk from the Capitol South Metro Station. Further details, including departure time, information on meals, and expected arrival back at WISH, will be provided in advance of this field trip.
