Montesquieu is well-known as a paragon of the "Moderate Enlightenment"—a booster of commerce and theorist of constitutional balance that loomed large in America's Founding. However, underexplored affinities between Montesquieu and key figures in the Scottish Enlightenment can enlarge our understanding of his moderation. They highlight that it is not merely a legalistic notion, but a deeper, cross-Channel vision of how commercial ends and public spiritedness may be harmonized. In examining the precise dynamics of such a reconciliation, *Montesquieu's Moderation* emphasizes the critical importance of Montesquieu's notion of honour, which explains how a feudal propensity for social distinctions can preserve civic virtue within an emerging inward-looking liberal order.
